Litigated Claims Update

CLAIMS LITIGATION - 2023 YEAR END REVIEW (January 1, 2023 - December 31, 2023)

Overview of Incoming Lawsuits and Pending Volume:

From January through December 2023, Citizens was served with a total of 9,464 lawsuits (9,298 Residential Property, 19 Commercial Property and 149 Liability) – averaging 789 new lawsuits per month. This reflects a 20% decrease in the number of new incoming suits per month as compared to the prior year (2022 average: 984 new lawsuits per month).

Third Party Liability – 149 Total (<2% of Overall Total)

As of December 31, 2023, the pending volume totaled 17,952 lawsuits (17,616 Residential Property, 142 Commercial Property and 194 Liability). This reflects an 11% decrease compared to the end of 2022 (20,282 pending matters).






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63% of the incoming Residential Property lawsuits arose out of the Tri-County area. This represents a 16% decrease in the distribution of Lawsuits originating from the Tri-County area, primarily due to the increasing distribution arising out of other areas of the state.








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The plaintiff was represented at First Notice of Loss in 53% of incoming residential property lawsuits. This represents a 29% increase as compared to 2022. This is expected as we move away from significant CAT events as insureds are more likely to self-report without representation immediately following a CAT loss.






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
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In 2% of the incoming Residential Property lawsuits the insured did not dispute Citizens' position or adjustment of the claim prior to filing suit which represents a 78% decrease compared to 2022. This is a direct and intended effect of the Notice of Intent statute.



A review of the timing of incoming lawsuits reveals that 25% of lawsuits are brought within 6 months of the First Notice of Loss (FNOL). This is a 15% decrease compared to 2022. This is an expected effect from the Notice of Intent statute as an insured is required to notify Citizens of any dispute prior to pursuing litigation.

Water Loss, AOB and CAT:

Year End 2023


New incoming CAT lawsuits increased by 14%, representing 44% of all new incoming lawsuits for 2023. Pending CAT lawsuits decreased by 1%, representing 47% of all pending lawsuits from January through December 2023, and continue to be the leading cause of loss in both new and pending lawsuits.

AOB lawsuits, however, decreased by 44%, representing 25% of all new incoming lawsuits for 2023. Pending AOB lawsuits decreased by 19% as compared to 2022, representing 29% of all pending lawsuits.

Non-Weather Water Lawsuits represent 28% of all new incoming lawsuits for the year, a 36% increase, and 25% of all pending, a 13% increase as compared to 2022.

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2024 YEAR TO DATE - JANUARY

As of January 31, 2024, Citizens was served with 760 new, incoming lawsuits (753 Residential Property, 2 Commercial Property, 5 Liability). This reflects a 7% increase in the receipt of new lawsuits as compared to January 2023.

CAT Lawsuits currently represent 50% of all new incoming lawsuits (a 33% increase as compared to January 2023) and 47% of pending lawsuits (a 1% increase as compared to January 2023), keeping CAT as the leading cause of loss in both new and pending lawsuits.

AOB Lawsuits currently represent 24% of new incoming lawsuits (a 26% decrease compared to January 2023) and 28% of pending lawsuits (a 21% decrease as compared to January 2023).

Non-Weather Water Lawsuits currently represent 23% of new incoming lawsuits (a 4% increase as compared to January 2023), and 24% of pending lawsuits (a 12% increase as compared to January 2023).

CONCLUSION

The overall performance of 2023 reveals a downward trend in the receipt of new, incoming lawsuits. This trend is believed to be a direct result of the sweeping legislation enacted over the last few years, most notably the Notice of Intent and AOB legislation.

We are seeing a downward trend in pending volume associated with the decrease in new, incoming as well as the efforts to resolve matters in the court system.
